Robert Battaglia ("debtor"), by and through his trial attorney, Michael Fuller, alleges:

2.

JURISDICTION AND THE PARTIES

This is an adversary proceeding brought under 11 U.S.C. §§ 105 and 362(k), and the Oregon Unlawful Debt Collection Practices Act ("OUDCPA"), ORS 646.639 *et seq*.

3.

This Court has jurisdiction pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 1331, 1332, 1334, 157, and 1367 because a federal question exists, diversity of parties exists and the amount in controversy is satisfied, and because debtor's state law claim is so related to the automatic stay claim that they form part of the same case or controversy.

4.

This adversary proceeding is one arising in and related to the above-captioned bankruptcy case, filed under Chapter 7 of Title 11 now open in this Court, case number 12-64096-tmr7. The action for violating the automatic stay and for contempt are core proceedings under 28 U.S.C. § 157. Pursuant to § 157(e), debtor consents to a jury trial before the Bankruptcy Court.

5.

This is an action for declaratory relief, actual damages, statutory damages, punitive damages, sanctions, and attorneys fees and costs brought by debtor against Target National Bank ("creditor") resulting from willful ongoing violations of the automatic stay and laws governing debt collection.

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19.

After receiving actual written notice of debtor's bankruptcy case and the automatic stay, creditor willfully harassed debtor in an attempt to collect on a claim arising before the commencement of his bankruptcy case.

20.

Specifically, creditor continues to demand payment from debtor.

21.

After receiving post-petition collection demands from creditor and its debt collector, debtor's counsel wrote to creditor and its debt collector, warning them about the harassment.

22.

The letters asked creditor and its debt collector to call debtor's counsel and provided contact information.

23.

The letters were attached to copies of court-generated notices of bankruptcy case.

24.

Upon information and belief, debt collector communicated the existence of the automatic stay to creditor upon receiving the letter from debtor's counsel.

25.

Despite having received numerous written notices of debtor's bankruptcy case, creditor continued its harassment and sent debtor a demand letter in November.

26.

The November demand letter stated debtor's payment was due by December 13, 2012.

27.

The November demand letter threatened to assess fees against debtor.

28.

As a direct and proximate result of creditor's failure to take affirmative steps to ensure compliance with the automatic stay, debtor suffers actual damages, including ongoing worry, frustration, anger and other negative emotions to be proven at trial.

29.

As a direct and proximate result of creditor's choices, debtor suffers actual damages in the form time spent and expenses including fees and costs to remedy creditor's contempt.

CAUSES OF ACTION

FIRST CLAIM FOR RELIEF

(WILLFUL VIOLATION OF THE AUTOMATIC STAY)

(11 U.S.C. § 362(k))

Debtor incorporates the above by reference.

31.

Creditor continued collection efforts, despite receiving actual notices of the automatic stay, constituting ongoing willful violations of 11 U.S.C. § 362.

32.

Creditor's refusal to take immediate affirmative steps to remedy their contempt constitutes a willful ongoing violation of 11 U.S.C. § 362.

33.

Debtor is entitled to and so seeks punitive damages against creditor so it may become profitable for it to implement procedures to avoid this type of violation in the future.

34.

Debtor is injured as a result of creditor's willful violations, and so is entitled to actual damages, punitive damages, declaratory relief that creditor violated the automatic stay, and attorneys fees and costs to remedy the contempt pursuant to 11 U.S.C. § 362(k).

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Debtor is entitled to and so demands a jury trial on the OUDCPA claims.

WHEREFORE, debtor request judgment against creditor as follows:

- A. Declaratory judgment that creditor willfully violated the automatic stay;
- B. An Order holding creditor in contempt;
- C. An award of actual damages against creditor;
- D. An award of statutory damages against creditor;
- E. An award of punitive damages against creditor;
- F. An award of mild sanctions against creditor;
- G. An award of expenses, including reasonable attorneys fees and costs against creditor;
- H. For such other and further relief as this Court may deem just and proper.
